
#### **BID BULLETIN NO. BAC-G LBI 2021-001**

This Bid Bulletin clarifies the queries that were raised during the Pre-Bid Conference, with online coverage, held on 26 January 2021 at 10:00 AM at the BCDA Corporate Center and queries sent through e-mail by prospective bidders, as well as, other matters relative to the Procurement of Supplies, Services, and Equipment for the International Cable Landing Stations, Repeater Stations Facilities, and Luzon Bypass Infrastructure Operation.

If needed, the Winning Bidder should determine specific areas for excavation in order for DICT to secure the required permits for these identified areas. Further, the traffic management must be planned by the Winning Bidder with the corresponding LGU advised thereof. Furthermore, Brgy Clearance must be secured on top of the permit from the LGU.

#### **Other Queries**

1. Can bidders purchase the bid documents, pay the bid and performance securities, etc. online?

Yes. Bidders can purchase the bidding documents, pay the bid security, and performance security online using a bankto-bank fund transfer method. Interested bidders shall inform BAC-G via email that it chooses to purchase the bidding documents, pay the bid security, and/or performance security, etc. online. BAC-G will coordinate with the bidder and provide the necessary steps procedures to be followed in paying online. Once online payment is verified, BCDA shall issue an Official Receipt (OR) and email a scanned copy of the OR to the bidder. In turn, the bidder shall acknowledge the receipt of the emailed scanned OR to the BAC Secretariat for its information. The Bidder can claim the original copy of the OR from the BCDA cashier during business hours anytime afterwards.

The bidder **must** include a copy of the (scanned) OR in the submission of its bid documents.









2.	How will the bidders submit bid proposals?	The bidders are required to submit their eligibility requirements, technical and financial proposals to the BCDA Corporate Center 2F Bonifacio Technology Center, 2nd Ave. corner 31st Street, BGC, Taguig City. Please be assured that the BCDA follows and implements a strict company health protocol which includes the disinfection of all documents, especially external documents, and the BCDA premises, on a regular basis.
3.	If bidders choose to avail the bid documents online instead of getting them from the BCDA Office, how will bidders receive the bid documents online?	Bid Documents may also be downloaded free of charge from the website of the Philippine Government Electronic Procurement System (PhilGEPS) and the website of BCDA (www.bcda.gov.ph).  However, only those who paid for the bid documents are allowed to submit their
		documents are allowed to submit their bids and participate in the bidding.
4.	Is it possible for a bidder to attend the opening of the bids online?	Yes. Bidders have the option to attend the bid opening either physically by themselves or their representative/s at the designated venue or through their virtual presence via video conferencing through a Zoom Meeting Link. An email invitation will be sent to bidders who purchased the bid documents.
5.	How safe are the bid documents from viruses once they are opened during the bid opening?	BCDA is following a strict health protocol and has put in place a disinfection procedure/area to disinfect all external documents. Thus, BCDA assures the bidders that the Bid Documents are safe during the Bid Opening.
6.	How will BAC-G conduct the post- qualification during the GCQ?	The BAC-TWG and representatives shall conduct the post-qualification activities provided under the Revised IRR of RA 9184 and GPPB Resolutions with utmost care and mindful of all the precautionary measures and health safety protocols that









the government enjoins to be observed. The TWG will conduct validation of documents in the bidder's place of business or conduct interviews with the key officers of the bidder via video conferencing. For this purpose, the bidder shall submit the email addresses of its concerned officers and managers to be interviewed prior to the post qualification.

Also, the bidder must ensure that the original copies of the bid documents submitted to BCDA shall be disinfected prior to its inspection by the BAC-G. The bidder shall prepare and reserve a well-ventilated and spacious room, making social and physical distancing possible, where the inspection of the said original documents will be held.

Finally, BAC-G TWG/representatives and bidder's representatives are enjoined to wear a facial mask, in good health condition, and maintain physical distance during the post qualification process.



If the Bidder shall participate in the procurement of all lots, the bidder shall pay the total amount of Php25,000.00 as the fee of all bidding documents.

- c. The bid should not be more than the ABC, otherwise the bidder shall be disqualified.
- d. The bidders must be registered with PhilGEPS under Platinum Membership, otherwise the bidders will be rated failed which shall result in declaring them as "ineligible".
- e. The bid documents can be accessed from the PhilGEPS and BCDA websites.
- f. The bidders must have completed similar contracts within the prescribed time frame, as shown in the table below, prior to the date of submission and receipt of bids. g. (FORM SF-GOOD-13a) Statement of ALL **ongoing government and private contracts, including contracts awarded but not yet started, if any**, whether similar or not similar in nature and complexity to the contract to be bid.

The Statement of All Ongoing Contracts shall indicate, for each contract, the following:

- 1. name of the contract;
- 2. date of the contract;
- 3. contract duration
- 4. owner's name and address;
- 5. kinds of Goods;
- 6. amount of contract and value of outstanding contracts; and
- 7. date of delivery.

The requirement for the "Statement of all Ongoing Contracts" is merely a "statement" of all ongoing contracts. It refers to a "statement" to be made by the bidder relative to all its ongoing government and private contracts, and not the actual submission of the physical NOA, NTP or Contracts.

- h. (FORM SF-GOOD-13a) Statement of at least one (1) COMPLETED government and/or private contracts which is similar in nature supported with any of the following documents: (in accordance with Clause 5.4 of the BDS):
  - 1. End User's Acceptance; or
  - 2. Sales Invoice; or
  - 3. Official Receipt of the last payment received.

One (1) completed contract\* of similar nature whose contract amount is at least 50% of the ABC, or two (2) similar contracts with the aggregate contract amount which is equivalent to at least 50% of the ABC, is acceptable.

- i. The bidders must follow and be guided by the checklist of requirements as discussed during the pre-bid conference. The bidders must also use the revised forms of the 1) Ongoing and Completed Contracts and 2) Statement of Single Largest Completed Contract.\* These are all attached herewith as Annex A.
- j. A bid bulletin would be posted in PhilGEPS and BCDA website on 02 February 2021. However, only those who purchased the bidding documents are entitled to directly receive a copy of the Bid Bulletin by email.
- k. Only those bidders who purchased the bid documents are allowed to submit their bids.

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I. The computation of the bid security shall be based on the Approved Budget for the Contract (ABC).

- m. The bidders may submit a notarized Bid Securing Declaration in lieu of other forms of bid security, up to the post qualification. It is important to note, however, that although the Bid Securing Declaration does not require cash, its enforcement shall include automatic blacklisting and payment of certain fines in the event that the bidder violates any of the conditions set forth in the bidding documents.
- n. NFCC Computation shall be based on the Audited Financial Statements for the year 2019, using the computation provided in the Instruction to Bidders, and should be at least equivalent to the ABC.
- o. The bidders are requested to use tabs in compiling their bid documents for quick and easy identification and verification.

#### 3. Reminders

- a. BCDA adheres to the "No-Contact Rule". All clarifications shall be made in writing and addressed to the BAC-G Secretariat.
- b. Visiting or calling the members of the BAC, the TWG, the Secretariat or anyone working for BCDA is not allowed and will not be entertained.
- c. Dates, in the absence of any qualifications, are meant to be calendar days. Calendar days include Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays.
- d. The deadline for the submission of bids is on 09 February 2021 at 09:00 AM at the BCDA Central Receiving and Releasing Area (CRRA) located at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor Bonifacio Technology Center, 31st St. cor. 2nd Avenue, Bonifacio Global City, Taguig City. The computer system clock, set at Philippine Standard Time (PhST), shall be used as a reference in determining the time for the submission of bids. 



#### WAGE ORDER NO. RBIII-22

#### SETTING THE MINIMUM WAGE RATES IN REGION III

WHEREAS, the Regional Tripartite Wages and Productivity Board – Region III, is mandated under Republic Act 6727 (The Wage Rationalization Act), to periodically assess wage rates and conduct continuing studies to determine and fix minimum wage rates in the region and issue corresponding Wage Orders, subject to the guidelines issued by the National Wages and Productivity Commission;

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Sec. 3 (a) of NWPC Guidelines No. 01, Series of 2007, ("Amended Rules of Procedure on Minimum Wage Fixing") and NWPC Guidelines No. 01, Series of 2015 ("Guidelines in the Conduct of Public Consultations"), the Board "motu proprio" scheduled a series of provincial sectoral wage consultations to determine if there is a need to issue a new wage order, considering the socioeconomic indicators in the region and its provinces;

WHEREAS, the Board conducted public consultations in the following provinces: Bulacan and Pampanga (August 6, 2019); Bataan and Zambales (August 20, 2019); Tarlac and Nueva Ecija (September 10, 2019); and Aurora (September 11, 2019). A regional public hearing was held thereafter in the province of Pampanga on September 20, 2019;

whereas, considering the result of the studies made on the prevailing socioeconomic conditions in the region and its provinces, the immediate call and appeal of all interested parties from both the workers' and employers' sector, and the results of the conduct of the provincial public consultations and regional public hearing, the Regional Board agreed to aid workers and their families to cope with the rising cost of living, help place every family in a decent and humane living condition, and at the same time promote the productivity of business enterprises as providers of employment opportunities;

WHEREAS, the Board deemed it just and equitable to increase the minimum wage, considering the amount needed to restore the purchasing power of the workers' wages, the need to share the fruits of the regional economic growth and development, and further intensify the promotion for installation of productivity-based incentive schemes under the Two-Tiered Wage System;

**NOW THEREFORE**, by virtue of the power and authority vested under Republic Act No. 6727, otherwise known as the Wage Rationalization Act, the Board hereby issues this Wage Order:

Section 1. AMOUNT OF INCREASE. Upon the effectivity of this Order, the basic pay of all private sector workers in the provinces of Aurora, Bataan, Bulacan, Nueva Ecija, Pampanga, Tarlac, and Zambales shall be adjusted by TWENTY

PESOS (Php20.00) per day.

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The old and new minimum wage rates of covered workers in the private sector in Region III shall be as follows:

Section 2. COVERAGE. The new wage rates provided herein shall apply to all workers and employees receiving the minimum wage in the private sector in the region, regardless of their position, designation or status of employment and irrespective of the method by which their wages are paid.

This Wage Order shall not cover household or domestic workers and persons employed in the personal service of another and workers of Barangay Micro Business Enterprises with Certificates of Authority, pursuant to R.A. 9178.

**Section 3. BASIS OF INCREASE.** The wage increase prescribed under this Wage Order shall be for the normal working hours, which shall not exceed eight (8) hours work a day.

Section 4. WORKERS PAID BY RESULTS. All workers paid by results, including those who are paid on piecework, "takay", "pakyaw", or task basis, shall be entitled to receive the prescribed increase in this order per eight (8) hours a day, or a proportion thereof for working less than eight (8) hours.

**Section 5. SPECIAL GROUP OF WORKERS.** The minimum wage rate of apprentices and learners shall in no case be less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the prescribed minimum wage rate under Section 1 of this Wage Order.

All recognized learnership and apprenticeship agreements entered into before the effectivity of this Order shall be considered automatically modified in accordance with the Wage Order.

All qualified handicapped workers shall receive the full amount of the new wage rates prescribed pursuant to R.A. 7277, otherwise known as the Magna Carta for Disabled Person.

Section 6. PRODUCTIVITY-BASED WAGES. In order to sustain rising levels of wages and enhance competitiveness, businesses are strongly encouraged to adopt productivity improvement schemes, such as, time and motion studies, good housekeeping, quality circles, labor-management cooperation, as well as implement gain-sharing programs. Accordingly, the Regional Board shall provide the necessary studies and technical assistance pursuant to RA 6971, the Productivity Incentives Act of 1990.

Section 7. PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS. In the case of private educational institutions, the share of workers and employees covered in the increase in tuition fees for School Year 2019-2020 shall be considered as compliance with this Wage Order. Where the share of the workers and employees is less than what is provided herein, the employer shall pay the difference starting School Year 2020-2021.

Private educational institutions which have not increased their tuition fees for the School Year 2019-2020 may defer compliance with the provisions of this Wage Order until School Year 2020-2021.

In any case, all private educational institutions shall implement the increase prescribed herein starting School Year 2020-2021.

Section 8. CONTRACTORS. In the case of contracts for construction projects and for security, janitorial and similar services, the prescribed wage increase of the workers shall be borne by the principals or clients of the construction/service contractors and their contracts shall be deemed amended accordingly. In the event, however, that the principals or clients fail to pay the prescribed increases, the construction/service contractors shall be jointly and severally liable with his principal or client.

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Section 9. EXEMPTION. Upon application with and as determined by the Board, the following may be exempt from the applicability of this Wage Order, subject to applicable rules and regulations issued by the Commission:

- Distressed Establishments, as defined in the NWPC Guidelines No. 02, Series of 2007;
- Establishments adversely affected by calamities such as natural and/or human-induced disasters in accordance with NWPC Resolution No. 01, Series of 2014.

Section 10. APPEAL TO THE COMMISSION. Any party aggrieved by this Wage Order may file a verified appeal to the Commission through the Board within ten (10) calendar days from the publication of the Order.

Section 11. EFFECT OF FILING OF APPEAL. The filing of the appeal does not operate to stay the Order unless the party appealing such Order shall file with the Commission an undertaking with a surety or sureties satisfactory to the Commission for payment of the corresponding increase to employees affected by the Order in the event such Order is affirmed.

Section 12. CREDITING. Increases granted by an employer within ninety (90) days prior to the effectivity of this Wage Order shall be credited as compliance with the Order, provided that, where such increases are less than what is provided in the Order, the employer shall pay the difference.

Such increases shall not include CBA anniversary wage increases, merit wage increases and those resulting from the regularization or promotion of employee, unless there is an agreement expressly allowing such crediting.

Section 13. EFFECTS ON EXISTING WAGE STRUCTURE. Pursuant to Article 124 of the Labor Code of the Philippines, as amended, any dispute that should arise as a result of a significant wage distortion, the employer and the union shall negotiate to correct the distortion through the grievance procedure under their Collective Bargaining Agreement, and if it remains unresolved, through voluntary arbitration. Unless otherwise agreed by the parties in writing, such dispute shall be decided by the voluntary arbitrator or panel of voluntary arbitrators within ten (10) calendar days from the time said dispute was referred to voluntary arbitration.

In cases where there are no collective bargaining agreements or recognized labor unions, the employers and workers shall endeavor to correct such distortions. Any dispute arising therefrom shall be settled through the National Conciliation and Mediation Board (NCMB) and if it remains unresolved after ten (10) calendar days of conciliation, the same shall be referred to the appropriate branch of the National Labor Relations Commission (NLRC). The NLRC shall conduct continuous hearings and decide the dispute within twenty (20) calendar days from the time said dispute is submitted for compulsory arbitration.

Section 14. COMPLAINTS FOR NON-COMPLIANCE. Complaints for non-compliance with this Wage Order shall be filed with the Regional Office of the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) having jurisdiction over the workplace and shall be subject to the mandatory thirty (30) days conciliation and mediation process under Single Entry Approach (SEnA). However, if settlement fails, the case becomes subject of enforcement proceedings under Article 128 and 129 of the Labor Code, as amended.

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- Section 15. NON-DIMINUTION OF BENEFITS. Nothing in this Wage Order shall be construed to reduce any existing wage rates, allowances, and benefits of any form under existing laws, decrees, issuance, executive orders and/or under any contract or agreement between workers and employers.
- Section 16. PENAL PROVISION. Any person, corporation, trust or firm, partnership, association or entity which refuses or fails to pay the prescribed wage rates in accordance with this Wage Order shall be subject to the penal provisions under R.A. 6727, as amended by R.A. 8188.
- Section 17. PROHIBITION AGAINST INJUNCTION. No preliminary or permanent injunction or temporary restraining order may be issued by any court, tribunal, or other entity against any proceedings before the Board.
- Section 18. FREEDOM TO BARGAIN. This Wage Order shall not be construed to prevent workers in particular firms or enterprises of industries from bargaining for higher wages with their respective employers.
- Section 19. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. Any person, company, corporation, partnership, or any entities engaged in business shall submit a verified itemized listing of their labor component to the Board not later than January 31, 2019 and every year thereafter in accordance with the form prescribed by the Commission.
- Section 20. REPEALING CLAUSE. All orders, rules, and regulations, or parts thereof inconsistent with the provision of this Wage Order are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.
- Section 21. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE. If, for any reason, any section or provision of this Wage Order is declared unconstitutional or illegal, the other provisions or parts shall remain valid.
- Section 22. IMPLEMENTING RULES. The Board shall prepare the necessary rules to implement this Wage Order subject to the approval of the Secretary of Labor and Employment.
- Section 23. ADVISORY ON PERFORMANCE BASED INCENTIVE PAY. Pursuant to the Two-Tiered Wage System, Advisory No. RTWPBIII-01 has been issued to guide establishments in the formulation, adoption and implementation of productivity programs and performance and productivity-based incentive schemes that an enterprise may provide based on agreement between workers and management.
- Section 24. EFFECTIVITY. This Wage Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation.

# WAGE ORDER NO. RB1-20

"PROVIDING FOR NEW DAILY MINIMUM WAGE RATES OF WORKERS AND EMPLOYEES IN REGION 1."

WHEREAS, the Regional Tripartite Wages and Productivity Board No. 1 (RTWPB-1) is mandated under R.A. 6727 (The Wage Rationalization Act) to periodically review the prevailing socio-economic and other conditions in the Region and if necessary to determine the applicable daily minimum wage rates;

WHEREAS, the previous Wage Order No. RB1-19 issued by the Board on November 24, 2017 which took effect on 25 January 2018 had already reached its one (1) year anniversary on 25 January 2019;

WHEREAS, in the absence of any petition for wage increase, the Board, motu proprio, reviewed the existing wage rates, and after due notice to concerned labor and management sectors, conducted public hearings on 15 February 2019 in Dagupan City, Pangasinan for the provinces of La Union and Pangasinan and 19 February 2019 in Vigan City for the provinces of Ilocos Sur and Ilocos Norte with concerned labor and management sectors in order to determine whether there is a need to adjust the minimum wages in the Region;

WHEREAS, after giving due consideration on the results of the public hearings and consistent with the government policy of inclusive growth, the Board deemed it necessary to adjust the prevailing daily wage rates of workers/employees in the Region to enable them to cope with the rising cost of living without impairing the viability of business and industry;

**WHEREAS**, there is a need to simplify the wage structure and adopt employment size in determining the classification of the various industries for easier administration and implementation of the wage order as well as to conform with the provisions of RA 6727, Sec. 4(a), which provides, among others, employment size as basis.

**NOW THEREFORE,** by virtue of the power and authority vested under Republic Act No. 6727, otherwise known as the Wage Rationalization Act, the Regional Tripartite Wages and Productivity Board – Region 1 hereby issues this Order.

#### SECTION 1. NEW MINIMUM WAGE RATES

Upon the effectivity of this Order, the Minimum Wage Rates of all workers/employees in the private sector in the Region shall be increased as follows:

- For workers receiving P310/day in establishments employing 30 or more, shall receive an increase of P30/day.
- For workers receiving P285/day in establishments employing 10 to 29 workers, shall receive an increase of P25/day.

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- c. For workers receiving P265/day in establishments employing less than 10 workers, shall receive an increase of P17/day.
- d. For workers receiving P256/day in establishments employing less than 10 workers, shall receive an increase of P17/day upon effectivity of this Order and additional P9/day 6 months after effectivity of this Order.
- e. For workers receiving P265/day in Agriculture Plantation enterprises, shall receive an increase of THIRTY PESOS (P30.00)/day.
- f. For workers receiving P256/day in Agriculture Non-Plantation enterprises, shall receive an increase of TWENTY SIX PESOS (P26.00)/day.

#### SECTION 2. COVERAGE:

All workers/employees in the private sector receiving the minimum wage rates in the Region are covered by the wage increase prescribed herein irrespective of their positions, designations or status of employment and regardless of the method by which their wages are paid.

This Order shall not cover Kasambahay/Domestic workers; persons employed in the personal service of another; and workers and employees of registered Barangay Micro Business Enterprises (BMBE) with Certificates of Authority pursuant to Republic Act 9178, as amended.

# SECTION 3. BASIS OF MINIMUM WAGE

The minimum wage rates prescribed under this Order shall be for the normal working hours which shall not exceed eight (8) hours work per day.

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# SECTION 4. PRODUCTIVITY AND OTHER PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE PROGRAM (PIP)

In order to sustain increasing levels of wages and enhance competitiveness, labor and management as partners are encouraged to adopt productivity improvement schemes that will improve the quality of life of workers and in turn enable them to produce and earn more, such as time and motion studies, good housekeeping, quality circles, labor and management cooperation as well as implement gain-sharing and other performance incentive programs.

Pursuant to the Two-Tiered Wage System, Wage Advisory No. RB 1-01 has been issued to guide private establishments in the formulation, adoption and implementation of productivity programs and performance and productivity-based incentive that an enterprise may provide based on agreement between workers and management.

The Board shall continue to issue advisories on PIPs for adoption by all sectors in the Region.

# SECTION 5. MINIMUM WAGE RATES APPLICABLE TO BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS WITH MULTIPLE BUSINESS ACTIVITIES

The minimum wage rates applicable to business establishments performing multiple business activities not separately registered with any appropriate government agency shall be determined in accordance with their dominant business activity.

# SECTION 6. CREDITABLE WAGE INCREASE

Wage increases granted by an employer within three (3) months prior to the effectivity of this Wage Order by virtue of Collective Bargaining Agreement in unionized establishments and those of the non-unionized sectors setting equal or greater than the minimum wage rates herein provided shall be considered compliance herewith; and

Anniversary wage increases, merit wage increases and those resulting from their regularizations or promotion of employees shall not be credited ascompliance.

#### SECTION 7. WORKERS PAID BY RESULTS

All workers paid by results, including those who are paid on piecework, "takay", "pakyaw" or task basis, shall receive not less than the adjusted amount prescribed by this Order for the normal working hours which shall not exceed eight (8) hours per day or a proportion thereof for working less than eight (8) hours.

# SECTION 8. WAGES OF SPECIAL GROUPS OF WORKERS AND EMPLOYEES

Persons employed under Apprenticeship or Learnership Agreement shall be entitled to not less than Seventy Five Percent (75%) of the new minimum wage rates under this Order.

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\ Vm. All Learnership and Apprenticeship Agreements entered into before the effectivity of this Order shall be automatically modified insofar as their wage clauses are concerned to reflect the new prescribed wage rates.

All qualified handicapped workers shall receive the full amount of increase in this Order pursuant to R.A. 7277.

# SECTION 9. APPLICATION TO PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

All Private Educational Institutions shall implement this Order starting School Year 2018-2019.

The share in the tuition fee increases of covered workers and employees for School Year 2018-2019 shall be considered as compliance with this Order, however, payment of any shortfall shall be given starting School Year 2019-2020.

Private Educational Institutions which have not increased their tuition fees for the School Year 2018-2019, may defer compliance with the provisions of this Order until School Year 2019-2020.

# SECTION 10. APPLICATION TO CONTRACTORS

In the case of contracts for construction projects and for security, janitorial and similar services, the prescribed increase shall be borne by the principals or clients of the construction/service contractors and the contracts shall be deemed amended accordingly. In the event, however, that the principals or clients fail to pay the prescribed increase, the construction/service contractors shall be jointly and severally liable with their principals or clients.

# SECION 11. MOBILE AND BRANCH WORKERS/EMPLOYEES

The minimum wage rates of workers and employees, who by the nature of their work have to travel, shall be those applicable in the domicile or head office of the employer.

The minimum wage rates of workers and employees working in branches or agencies of establishments within or outside the region shall be those applicable in the place where they are stationed.

## SECTION 12. TRANSFER OF WORKERS AND EMPLOYEES

The transfer of workers and employees from one region to another shall not diminish the wage rates being enjoyed by them prior to such transfer. The workers and employees transferred to other regions with higher wage rates shall be entitled to the minimum wage rate applicable therein.

## **SECTION 13. EXEMPTION**

The following categories of establishments may be exempted from compliance with this Order, upon application with and as determined by the Board in accordance with the National Wages and Productivity Commission (NWPC) Guidelines No. 2, Series of 2007 (NWPC Amended Rules on Exemption)

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- 1. Distressed establishments;
- 2. New business establishments:
- Retail/Service establishments employing not more than ten (10) workers; and
- 4. Establishments adversely affected by calamities such as natural and human-induced disasters.

# SECTION 14. DURATION AND EXTENT OF EXEMPTION

Establishments that applied for exemption and found qualified may be granted a partial or full exemption of one (1) year in accordance with the NWPC Guidelines No. 02, Series of 2007.

# SECTION 15. EFFECT OF APPLICATION FOR EXEMPTION

An application for exemption duly filed shall have the effect of deferring any action on any complaint for non-compliance with the Order until resolution of the application by the Board.

In case the application for exemption is not approved, covered workers and employees of the applicant-establishment shall be paid the prescribed minimum wage rates under this Order plus one percent (1%) simple interest per month retroactive to the effectivity of this Order.

#### SECTION 16. APPEAL TO THE COMMISSION

Any party aggrieved by this Order may file a verified appeal with the NWPC through the Board within ten (10) calendar days from the publication of this Order.

#### SECTION 17. EFFECT OF AN APPEAL

The filing of the appeal does not operate to stay this Order unless the party appealing such Order shall file with the NWPC an undertaking with a surety or sureties satisfactory to the NWPC for payment of the corresponding increase for covered workers and employees in the event this Order is affirmed.

## SECTION 18. EFFECT ON EXISTING WAGE STRUCTURE

In case the wage increases provided for by this Order result in the distortion of the wage structure within an establishment, the same shall be corrected in accordance with the procedure provided for under Article 124 of the Labor Code, as amended.

# SECTION 19. COMPLAINTS FOR NON-COMPLIANCE

Complaints for non-compliance with this Order shall be filed with the Department of Labor and Employment Regional Office I (DOLE-Region 1) having jurisdiction over the workplace and shall be subject to the mandatory thirty (30) day conciliation and mediation process under Single Entry Approach (SEnA). However, if settlement fails, the case becomes subject of enforcement proceedings under Article 128 of the Labor Code, as amended.

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# SECTION 20. NON-DIMINUTION OF BENEFITS

Nothing in this Order shall be construed to reduce any existing wage rates, allowances and benefits of any form under existing laws, decrees, issuances, executive orders and/or under any contract or agreement between the workers/employees and employers.

#### SECTION 21. PENAL PROVISION

Any person, corporation, trust or firm, partnership, association or entity who refuses or fails to pay the prescribed increases in this Order, shall be punished by a fine of not less than P25,000.00 nor more than P100,000.00 or imprisonment of not less than two (2) years nor more than four (4) years or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court pursuant to the provision of Section 12 of R.A 6727, as amended by R.A. 8188.

#### SECTION 22. PROHIBITION AGAINST INJUNCTION

No preliminary or permanent injunction or temporary restraining order may be issued by any court, tribunal or other entity against any proceedings before the Board.

#### SECTION 23. FREEDOM TO BARGAIN

This Order shall not be construed to prevent workers in particular firms or enterprises or industries from bargaining for higher wages with their respective employers.

# SECTION 24. REPORTORIAL REQUIREMENT

Any person, company, corporation, partnership or any entity engaged in the business shall submit a verified itemized listing of their labor component to the Board not later than 31 January 2019 and every year thereafter in accordance with the form prescribed by the NWPC.

#### SECTION 25. REPEALING CLAUSE

All orders, issuances, rules and regulations, or parts thereof inconsistent with the provision of this Order are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

#### SECTION 26. IMPLEMENTING RULES

The Board shall prepare the necessary rules to implement this Order subject to the approval of the Secretary of Labor and Employment.

## SECTION 27. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE

If, for any reason, any section or provision of this Order is declared unconstitutional or illegal, the other provisions or parts shall remain valid.



#### SECTION 28. EFFECTIVITY

This Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the Region.
